Climate change--In Yap or in Majuro: interview clients and other community members affected by climate change and rising sea levels (including those who have been forced to relocate from their low-lying islands); document how they have dealt with these problems; identify and develop a range of possible legal strategies for assisting both individual persons/families and the local community for responding to the effects of rising sea levels. Human trafficking--In Saipan or Palau: study the latest Trafficking in Persons Report (https://www.state.gov/j/tip/rls/tiprpt/2016/index.htm) and learn about human trafficking first hand through the lens of legal services. Based on your experience and interests, write a report about local human trafficking that would be suitable for publication. The report should be calculated to raise awareness of the problem; change perceptions so that trafficking is more visible and less tolerated; and/or highlight the value of legal services in reducing human trafficking.

Community lawyering to reduce health disparities—Probably in Saipan, but possibly another of our regional offices: work closely with a community health center/hospital to identify and describe unique factors affecting health and health care in Micronesia; write a report suitable for publication illuminating and illustrating some challenges and opportunities for communitybased lawyering to improve health outcomes.
